	Welcome Session for incoming students: 1st day of each semester		
	Exam dates: Regular exams take place from mid-January to the beginning of February (1st semester), respectively the first 3 weeks of June (2nd semester), immediately after the end of the semester. There is a regular exams session: the 1st semester session (end of January – beginning of February) and the 2nd semester session (end of May – mid-June). For the subjects for which the final evaluation is a colloquium, the examination takes place within the respective class (lecture or seminar), usually during the presession (the last two weeks of the semester). In case of failed exams, there is a re-examination session by the end of June for all the exams (winter and summer sessions). The students can re-sit an exam or colloquium where they were absent, failed or want a re-evaluation of the original grade.		
	The academic calendar becomes available by the end of June each year. The schedule of subjects is available at the beginning of each semester.		
Registration process & deadlines	The Bucharest University of Economic Studies accepts exchange students nominated by its partner universities. The nomination is done by e-mail at erasmus@ase.ro (full name, duration of the stay, e-mail). The nominated students will be contacted afterwards for the application process.

Language requirements	Depending on the language of instruction (English, French, German or Romanian), exchange students are required to have an advanced level for the respective language (minimum level B1 of the Common European Framework of Reference, recommended level B2), in order to be able to successfully complete courses at The Bucharest University of Economic Studies.		
	Our university does not require official language certificates as we trust our partners to send students who fulfill the aforementioned criteria.		
	However, if students do not meet the language requirements, we reserve us the right to withdraw them from courses.		
Foreign language courses	Foreign languages: English, French and German for intermediate and advanced learners, both as a first or second foreign language – economic language, business communication and correspondence. Foreign languages for beginners and intermediate levels (as electives): Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Russian, Spanish, Turkish. Courses are offered during both semesters, free of charge (2 h/week). Availability depends on the number of registered students in the elective courses.		

Courses in English:

English courses options for exchange students include more than 350 courses offered every term in a broad variety of business and economic fields, offered both at Bachelor's and Master's levels.

Courses in French/German: Apart from courses offered in English language, incoming exchange students can also attend a variety of courses taught in French/German in the field of business administration.

Class Format:

Each class has two types of activities: lectures (attended by a large number of students, provide the theoretical background) and application seminars (attended by smaller groups of students – around 20 – suppose practical activities: case studies, problem-solving, group discussions, simulations, paper preparation & presentation etc.).

Attendance and Participation:

Attendance at the lectures is not compulsory, but is strongly encouraged. Participation to seminars is usually part of the final examination (between 30 and 100% of the final grade, depending on the subject), so it is strongly recommended to attend all the seminars. The contents of the lectures and the evaluation methods are presented by each professor at the beginning of the semester (also presented in the course description).

Course Registration:

Exchange students are registered with the Department for International Relations and are allowed to choose from all the programs and years of study, provided they have the necessary background and language proficiency.

This system means courses might overlap. It is the students' responsibility to only register for courses they can attend in full.

Course Load:

There is no minimum or maximum requirement for incoming exchange students. Course load depends on the requirements of the home institution. We recommend 30 ECTS/semester.

Transcript of Records:

We will issue a grade report for each student at the end of the semester, which will be sent to the coordinator at the home university.

Grading system:

The Romanian grading scale is from 1 (minimum) to 10 (maximum), the minimum grade for passing an exam and obtaining the ECTS points corresponding to a subject is 5. The equivalent grades in the ECTS system are:

Final tests are generally in the form of written examination: the assimilation and critical understanding of lectures, assigned references and other related activities (field work, case studies etc.) are assessed. Seminar activities contribute to the final grade: active attendance, paper presentation, case studies etc.

	All the exchange students are accommodated in Belvedere A7 and A8 Students' Hall, situated at about 30 minutes from the university. Reservations are made through the Department of International Relations (accommodation form). Accommodation cost per semester: 675 Eur / per place in a double room, 450 Eur / place in a triple room. Accommodation guarantee: 300 Eur.
